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OVERVIEW

developed Team epitaphs. Using a group exercise, we will revisit the epitaphs and provide collective input on how Teams might strengthen their plans by increasing the focus of actions to address upstream determinants of health status.

PLACE MATTERS: UPDATE FROM THE JOINT CENTER HEALTH POLICY INSTITUTE

The Joint Center Health Policy Institute (HPI) has been busy establishing new collaborations with organizations to advance its goal of assisting communities of color in identifying short- and long-term policy objectives and related activities in HPI's seven focus areas.

Health Policy Institute Mission

The mission of the Joint Center Health Policy Institute (HPI) is to ignite a "Fair Health" movement that gives people of color the inalienable right to equal opportunity for healthy lives. Our goal is to help communities of color identify short- and long-term policy objectives and related activities in the following **seven key areas**:

1. Identifying and addressing the economic, social, environmental and behavioral determinants that can lead to improved health outcomes.
2. Increasing resource allocations for prevention and effective treatment of chronic illness.
3. Informing the policy and practice of reducing infant mortality and improving child and maternal health.
4. Reducing risk factors and supporting healthy behaviors among children and youth.
5. Improving mental health and reducing factors that promote violence.
6. Optimizing healthcare access and quality.
7. Creating conditions for healthy aging and improving the quality of life for seniors.

The Joint Center has already established a PLACE MATTERS technical assistance team to provide you and your Team members with technical assistance throughout the course of the initiative. As you will note on this DL contact list, we are fortunate to have several colleagues return to share their expertise with us. We are also pleased to welcome several colleagues new to the DLs who will share their expertise with Teams. We strongly encourage each Team to take advantage of these technical experts and leverage this DL to access their kind assistance.

By now, the CommonHealth ACTION resource team has contacted PLACE MATTERS Team leaders to prepare for this meeting in Lisle and to learn more about the progress of the Teams. We were delighted to learn of your collective

progress; the Teams are growing, with the vast majority reporting activity with meetings and conference calls. During the calls, some participants have inquired about these seven areas; while we included them in the DL Concept Paper #1, they also appear herein (see Health Policy Institute Mission text box; for additional resources on each area, visit www.jointcenter.org).

Several team leaders solicited further clarity regarding PLACE MATTERS outcomes and the Joint Center's plans for continued support. The HPI technical support team appreciates these inquiries and welcomes further dialogue. To a large extent, participating Teams will drive our expectations for PLACE MATTERS outcomes. We remain committed to advancing the national movement to improve health status by addressing the social determinants of health and will continue our active support of your local activity through February 2006.

Over the course of one year, we anticipate that each PLACE MATTERS team will:

- Establish a Team supported by strong leadership and solidified relationships
- Identify a Team lead (point of primary contact)
- Participate in four DL meetings
- Participate in PLACE MATTERS national meetings (see Table 1 below)
- Establish a clear vision and strategic plan inclusive of sustainability elements
- Be well-poised to demonstrate forward progress on the strategic plan
